Faulkner County Premium Sale Rules

The Faulkner County Premium Sale is a separate entity from the Faulkner County Fair and is not governed by the Faulkner County Fair Rules, but by rules set forth by the Faulkner County Premium Sale Committee. This Committee is composed of the following members that have been and will continue to be involved in the agriculture issues facing the youth of our county. Please read the following rules very thoroughly for they do govern this sale. Any issues not covered in these rules should be presented to the executive committee, in writing, explaining the nature of the issue or concern, at which time the committee will make a ruling and that ruling will stand. The executive committee will be appointed by the chairman and will be comprised of vo-ag teachers, one (1) extension Agent, 4-H leaders, and one (1) business sponsor.

The Faulkner County Premium Sale will be held on the Saturday morning of the Faulkner County Fair at 10 a.m. The Sale Committee will meet on the Friday prior to the sale at 7:30 a.m. to finalize the sale order; therefore, the sale order will NOT be posted prior to NOON ON Friday!

To be eligible for the sale you must be an Arkansas student who is a bona fide member of FFA, FCCLA, or a current 4-H member (as August 3 of the current year) in Faulkner County in good standing or have just moved into the county. To be eligible youth must be at least five (5) years old by the opening day of the fair and are eligible to show no later than the fall after graduating from high school (or the equivalent). Youth must meet the age criteria and exhibit a project under the supervision of a Vocational Agriculture teacher or a County Extension Agent at the Faulkner County Fair. Only FFA, FCCLA, and 4-H members from clubs or chapters in Faulkner County are eligible for the premium sale. If an exhibitor has shown and sold an animal in a premium sale in another county, they are not eligible to take part in the Faulkner County Premium Sale.

The exhibitor must show his/her own animal during the show in order to be eligible for the premium sale unless they do have two (2) animals in the same class or unless prior approval in writing from the sale committee; which, four (4) members must agree. The exhibitor must also show their animal during the selection of sale order as entered,

unless they have two (2) in the ring at the same time. The exhibitor must be present and exhibit his or her own animal during the sale on Saturday. Requests for substitute shower must be turned in to the Extension Agent or Vo-Ag teacher by 9 p.m. in writing Monday of fair week. All other activities (such as sports, band, etc.) will not be excused.

If an exhibitor is eligible to go to state fair, animals must be shown same as nominated at the state fair.

Each exhibitor will only be allowed to sell one (1) animal with the exception that all Grand and Reserve animals must sell. (Example: If a youth owns a Grand and Reserve, both animals will sell. If a youth has a Grand and a third, the youth must sell the Grand ONLY.

The Grand and Reserve pen of Broilers will sell. The broilers shown at the county fair are county birds, meaning they were received from the local county office with the agreement that they must be shown at the county fair.

These rules are subject to change at the discretion of the Faulkner County Premium Sale Committee. The committee hopes to have changes published by August 1; however, a final listing of sale rules will be posted at the opening of the Faulkner County Fair. The number of animals per species to sell will be announced at posting time.

Invest in Faulkner County Youth

Each year, 4-H and FFA members select and train animals to show at the County Fair. These animals represent a large part of the summer activities for these youth. Many hours are spent feeding, training, and grooming these animals so they will be in top condition for the county fair.

Through these projects, these young people learn important life skills such as proper methods of livestock production and management, self-discipline, and sportsmanship. They develop personal pride, leadership qualities, and an understanding of the economics of agriculture.

The auction is one of the most heartwarming and fun events during the fair. You won't want to miss seeing the young people and their award-winning animals.

While at the auction, you'll be joined by many other Falkner County business and government leaders. These community leaders come to the auction each year because—just like you—they care enough to invest in the county's future.

Your support in making bids on these projects will contribute to helping these youth meet their obligations to pay feed bills and bank notes. Profits made will either be used to finance next year's project, or to help with a college education.

Bidding at the auction is easy. You are bidding on a bonus to be paid to the young exhibitor above the market value they will receive from the processing company. Don't worry; you need never take possession of the livestock. This year's event features champion animals to include steers, hogs, lambs, meat goats, two (2) pens of broilers, champion meat rabbit pen, and champion fryer.

FOOD PRESERVATION RULES & REGULATIONS

2. Canned products must be shown in standard pint or quart jars or jelly jars. One jar constitutes an entry.
3. Each jar must be labeled in writing on the side of the jar, ¼ inch from the bottom. Do not write exhibitors name on jar. Jars with rusty bands or without bands will not be accepted. Labels are available in the County Extension Office.
4. Jams and jellies - ¼ inch head space. No paraffin sealed jars will be accepted.
5. Vegetables - 1 inch head space.
6. Pickles - no artificial coloring - ½ inch head space.
7. Fruits - ½ inch head space.

Points that will be considered in Judging:

1. **Containers - Standard jars.** Clean and polished lids, free from rust. Leave band on lid.
2. **Good portion of liquids and solids.** All products covered with liquids.
3. **Uniformity - Pieces of the same size and shape.** Natural, even color throughout.
4. **Texture - Products free from defects.** Show careful selection of products.
5. **Appearance.**

 - All poultry must submit leg & wing band numbers. A copy of pullorum/Typhoid 90 or Flock Certificate must be submitted to the Extension office.
 - All rabbits must be tattooed.
 - All breeding beef must submit registration numbers.
 - (c.) All Market animals must be castrated and healed by the opening day of the fair.
 - (d.) Under the direction of the livestock superintendent the fair board will make the call of removal of sick animals.
 - (e.) All ear tags must be in ear when animal arrives on the grounds. If a market animal is not entered in the State Fair, then a County ear tag must be put in animal's ear. Tags will be available from the Faulkner County Extension Office and cost will be passed on to the exhibitor. (This will apply to Market Hogs and Steers. Meat Goats and Market Lambs are exempt because they are required to have a Scrapies tag).
2. Exhibitors are limited to 2 market animals per species, except Market Lambs and Meat Goats, in which case the limit is 3. Exhibitors are limited to 2 entries per class in classes other than Market classes.
 3. All exhibitors may begin entering and must be in place no later than the times listed in the schedule of events at the beginning of the book. (NOTE: Animals may or may not be released after the show. The release of animals is based on overcrowding and the number of animals shown, therefore release information, where applicable, will be announced at a later date).
 - All exhibits remaining on the grounds must remain in place until 7:30 p.m. on the closing day of the Fair at the discretion of the Livestock Superintendent.
 4. All animals in the breeding class must be recorded and accepted for record in the recognized book for their respective breeds. Exhibitors must have registration certificate available with the exhibit at **ALL TIMES**. Except: Dairy Cattle
 5. All premiums shall be awarded on a point basis. The minimum value of a point shall be \$2.
 6. Any livestock or poultry shown at any other county fair will not be eligible for premiums.
 7. Each exhibitor must furnish his/her own buckets for watering and feeding.

8. Each exhibitors or someone in their family must come out and take care of their own livestock on a daily basis, except poultry. The Poultry Department will supply feeding equipment, feed and water all birds. This must be done by 9 a.m. each day. If livestock is unattended, the barn superintendent can see that it is cared for. Exhibitors will be charged for this expense and no premium checks will be given out until this bill is paid in full.
9. All livestock and tack must be off Fair Board grounds by midnight on the last day of the fair. Hereafter the Fair Board reserves the right to charge exhibitors when the Fair Board must take care of livestock that is left on premises or they could even be sold. The Fair Board also reserves the right to sell all tack left over 30 days or charge the exhibitor rent for storage.
10. All stalls, pens, and aisles must be kept in a clean, neat, and orderly fashion and all refuse disposed of as directed by the Superintendent.
11. No blocking/grooming chutes allowed in the aisles or on the asphalt inside the barn. An area will be provided for chutes. ALL AISLES MUST REMAIN CLEAR!
12. NO SMOKING will be permitted in the barns.
13. Dogs will not be permitted on the Fairgrounds.
14. To qualify for premiums, all exhibitors must bring into the Ring for adjudication any animal properly entered in any show class.
15. Where there are fewer entries in a Class than the number of places for premiums offered, the Judge shall award First, Second, Third, etc. as the animal deserves.
16. A designated area will be available for parking RV's and campers. All campers must park in this area. Check with Superintendent.
17. Junior Show Eligibility: This department is limited to Arkansas students only, who are a bona fide member of an FFA Chapter, 4-H Club, or a member of FCCLA in good standing in Faulkner County. Members from counties without a county fair such as Pulaski can show in Faulkner County. Exhibitors for the junior show must be at least five years of age by the opening day of the fair. Exhibitor's project program must be under the supervision of a Vocational Agriculture teacher or a County Extension Agent. Exhibitors may exhibit in this show no later than the fall after graduation from high school or receiving their GED Certificate (or the equivalent). 4-H Exhibitors who are 19 as of January 1st will not be eligible to show.

ALL LIVESTOCK ENTERING THE FAULKNER COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS MUST HAVE THE ORIGINAL HEALTH PAPER ACCOMPANYING THE ANIMAL UPON ARRIVAL. ALL PAPERS WILL BE CHECKED. IF THE ORIGINAL IS NOT AVAILABLE THE ANIMALS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO UNLOAD!

All livestock exhibitors with livestock entering the Faulkner County Fairgrounds must provide the Fair Superintendent with a copy of your health papers and registration papers (for breeding animals only). You must also keep the original in your possession at all times throughout the duration of the fair!

IT IS REQUIRED TO CLEAN YOUR STALL AND YOUR AREA, AND YOU MUST REMOVE ALL BEDDING PRIOR TO DISMISSAL OF ANIMALS!

Junior Exhibits

Junior Exhibits are limited to Arkansas students only, who are a bona fide member of a FFA Chapter, 4-H Club, or a member of FCCLA in good standing. Exhibitors for the junior show must be at least five years of age by the opening day of the fair. Exhibitor's project must be under the supervision of a Vocational Agriculture teacher, 4-H Leader, or a County Extension Agent. Exhibitors may exhibit in this show no later than the fall after graduating from high school or receiving their GED Certificate (or the equivalent). 4-H Exhibitors who are 19 as of January 1st of the current year will not be eligible to show. Exhibitors showing as Juniors (4-H, FFA, FCCLA) will not compete with or against exhibitors as Open in Beef or Dairy. The same official classes will be used for both Junior exhibitors and exhibitors in Open.

Open Divisions will ONLY be offered in the BREEDING BEEF and DAIRY CATTLE divisions!

Showmanship: *Only exhibitors which have shown as Juniors are eligible. Exhibitors must own animal shown and show in 4-H or FFA contest.*

EXHIBITION HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, AND EXOTIC ANIMALS FINAL RULE

Arkansas Livestock and Poultry Commission Agency No. 125.00

Effective: June 1, 2006

Act 87 of 1963 (Code 2-33-101), Act 150 of 1985 (Code 19-6-448) & Act 1306 of 1997 (Code 2-40-823)

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

1. CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION AND ENTRY PERMITS; “Certificate of veterinary inspection” refers to a legible record (made on an official form issued from the state of origin) by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet health requirements of the state of destination. It must bear the identification of each animal and separate certificates must be made for each species of animal entered. Entry permits are required on all out-of-state swine, rodeo bulls unless they are tested within thirty (30) days of entry, psittacines, passerines, ratites, all other avian species except poultry and turkeys, cervids, camelids, or exotic animals. Permits are also required on all cattle entering Arkansas from any state that is not a tuberculosis free state, unless that state has a reciprocal agreement with Arkansas. Permit numbers can be obtained from the state veterinarian’s office (501) 907-2400 from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A certificate of veterinary inspection must accompany all out-of-state animals; and
 - (a.) Must be available on request by animal health officials.
 - (b.) Individually identify all animals, showing positive identification of each animal by tattoo, ear tag, registration number or ear notch. Steers should be identified by description.
 - (c.) Show required tests, vaccinations, and entry permit number, if applicable
 - (d.) Show name and address of owner or exhibitor—this shall be the same name as under which animals are exhibited.
2. Any animal or poultry showing any evidence of infectious or contagious disease, or of external parasitism, and animals with active ringworm lesions (with the resulting loss of hair), multiple warts easily visible without close examination, or atrophic rhinitis, will not be permitted to exhibit.
3. All animals entering the grounds, including those shown in pet zoos, children’s banyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet requirements of their particular species.
4. All animals originating out of areas quarantined because of other diseases (vesicular stomatitis, scabies, etc.) shall not be permitted to enter the state.

**ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK
COUNTY, JUNIOR DISTRICT, DISTRICT, STATE FAIR LEVEL, AND
OTHER SHOWS**

1. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet the requirements of their particular species.
2. Arkansas livestock (except for Arkansas sheep, goats, horses, steers and rabbits) must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition, showing the following:

ARKANSAS CATTLE

1. If Arkansas is a Class Free State, Arkansas cattle are exempt from brucellosis testing. If Arkansas is not a Class Free State then the following testing requirements must be met:
Negative brucellosis test within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition, for females and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and over. All heifers that have calved or are bred must be tested. Animals originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free Herd are exempt if the Certified Free Herd number is shown on certificate.
2. All heifers that are four to twelve (4-12) months of age shall be vaccinated before entering show.
3. Heifers that were born on or after January 1, 1985, that are over twelve (12) months of age and are not official calthood vaccinates will not be allowed to show (unless they are from a Brucellosis Certified Free Herd.)

ARKANSAS SWINE

1. As of July 1, 2001, all swine must have official premise identification.
2. Animals six (6) months old or older to be tested negative for brucellosis within ninety (90) days of exhibition or originate directly out of a Validated Herd, with Validation number and date of last herd test shown on certificate (barrows exempt from brucellosis testing, but must be pseudorabies tested.)
3. Animals to be tested negative for pseudorabies regardless of age within ninety (90) days of the exhibition on a test approved by the state veterinarian or originate directly out of a Qualified Pseudorabies Free Herd, with Qualified Herd number and date of last test shown on certificate.
4. Free of other contagious, infectious, and communicable diseases (erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, etc.); otherwise they will not be allowed to show and will be released from fairgrounds.

ARKANSAS SHEEP AND GOATS

Exhibition officials must maintain records of all sheep and goats that are exhibited for a period of five years, to include:

- a) Identification Number
- b) Flock status as defined by the Voluntary Flock Certification Program
- c) The name, complete address and phone number of the owner.

Fair personnel, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel may examine sheep on grounds. Any sheep showing clinical symptoms of Scrapie shall be immediately quarantined in

isolation and required to undergo any approved diagnostic tests and shall be consigned to slaughter or destruction with submission of tissues to an approved diagnostic laboratory at the exhibitor's expense.

Commingling (as defined by the Arkansas Scrapie Regulation) of sheep or goats of different flock status as defined by the Voluntary Flock Certification Program (VFCEP) is prohibited and must be reported to the VFCEP state official and State Veterinarian.

No sheep or goats showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, sheep pox, evidence of fungal infection, evidence of abscesses or with draining abscesses will be allowed to show and may be released by fair officials, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel.

ARKANSAS RABBITS

Rabbits will be inspected on grounds. No rabbits showing symptoms of disease will be allowed to show.

ARKANSAS POULTRY

An official representing the exhibition shall notify the state veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition, giving names, place, inclusive dates, and time of the event.

The requirements are as follows:

1. All in-state poultry, which includes domesticated game birds, quail, pheasants, peafowl, guineas, and turkeys, present at exhibition in Arkansas shall have originated from U. S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition (pullorum-typhoid testing on fairgrounds during the fair is prohibited.) This information will be documented on a NPIP Form VS 9-3, 90-Day Certificate, NPIP Flock Certification Form or similar certificate that will accompany the poultry during exhibition.
2. All non-certified birds must be banded (leg or wing band), with a sealed band. Wraparound plastic bands are not acceptable. In-state waterfowl are exempt from Pullorum-typhoid requirements.
3. Any poultry showing evidence of infectious or contagious disease or insect infestation will not be permitted to exhibit.
4. Record Keeping -The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry present at exhibition.

This list shall contain the name and address of each owner, the number, the species, breed, variety, type, sex, and pullorum-typhoid status of all poultry present. A copy of this shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months.

On March 19, 1909 the first Faulkner County Fair Association was formed by the Conway Board of Trade under the leadership of its President, Jo Frauenthal, and its Secretary, G. L. Bahner. The Fair Association Board of Directors consisted of the following: H. B. Ingram (President), Stonewall Anderson (Vice President), L. C. Holman (Secretary), B. L. Harton (Treasurer), Jo Frauenthal, S. G. Smith, and William J. Grummer. L. C. Perry was appointed the first Fair Manager but moved from Conway in July of 1909, and Frank Farris was appointed to succeed him.

The first Faulkner County Fair was held on October 4 through October 7, 1909 on property owned by Judge Sam Frauenthal, which was bounded on the south by Oak Street, on the west by Harkrider Street, on the north by Mill Street, and on the east by Ingram. Governor Donaghey opened the first Faulkner County Fair at 11:30 a.m. on October 4, 1909. The first Faulkner County Fair was a success, however in the years to follow the fair began losing money. In August of 1915 the Faulkner County Fair decided to it was in the best interest not to continue with a fair.

Other than some county farm club fairs, there was not another Faulkner County Fair until 1938. Under the leadership of the Young Businessmen's Association, Faulkner County Free Fair was held in a building at the northwest corner of Locust Street and Oak Street. The president of the YBMA was R. A. McNutt and the Fair Chairman was Robert W. Mosley. Others on the fair committee were Theo Ashcraft (Treasurer), E. D. Bell, Dr. O. D. Smith, S. D. Mitchell, Eugene Hankins, and Mrs. Dora Stubblefield. The first fair in 1938 was such a success that it was decided to have a county fair the next year. From 1939 through 1942, the county fair was held on S. T. Smith's property at the northwest corner of Van Ronkle Street and Markham Street. In 1945 the County Fair was held at the Conway Airport property.

In 1946 the YBMA purchased property on Robins Street from Father Anthony Lachowsky and the Faulkner County Fair was held on this property through 2009.

2010 is the start of a new era for the Faulkner County Fair. From it's new location off of Hwy 64 to the luxury of new facilities, the Faulkner County Fair is sure to be a success for many years to come.
